

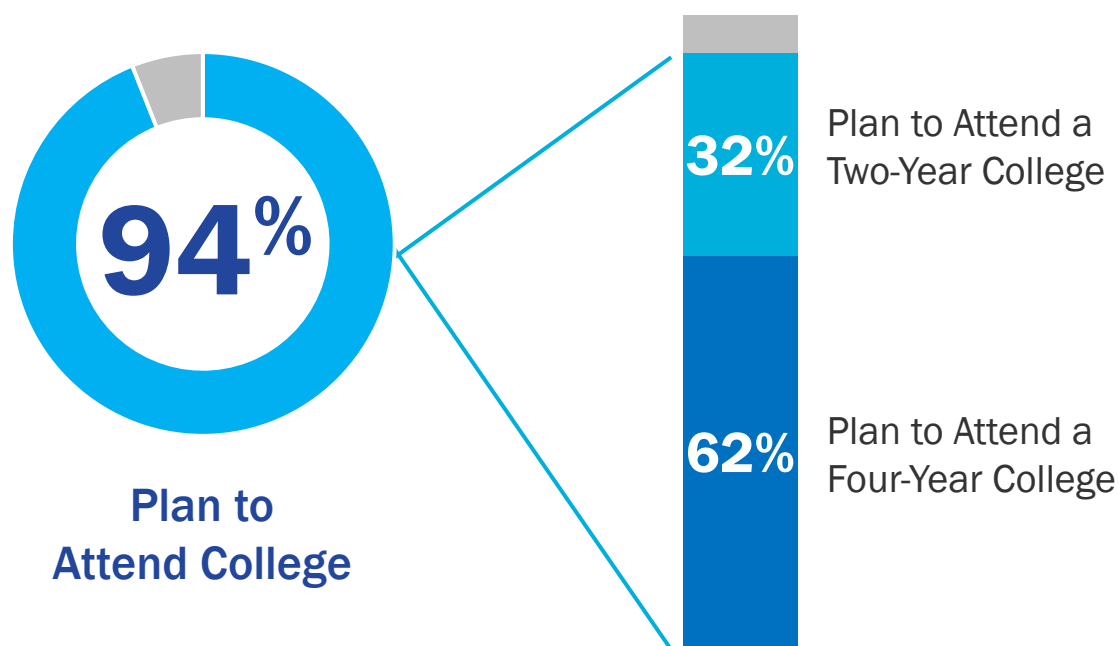

AVID Seniors' Plans – Class of 2017

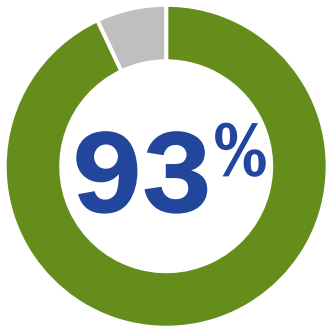


AVID students are ambitious when it comes to planning for a postsecondary education, with **6 out of every 10** committed to going to four-year colleges.

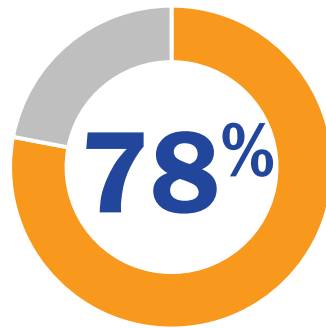

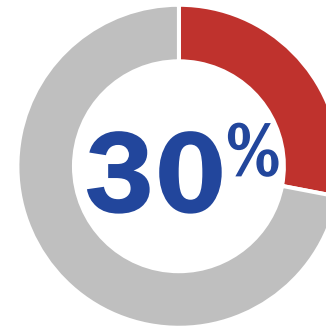

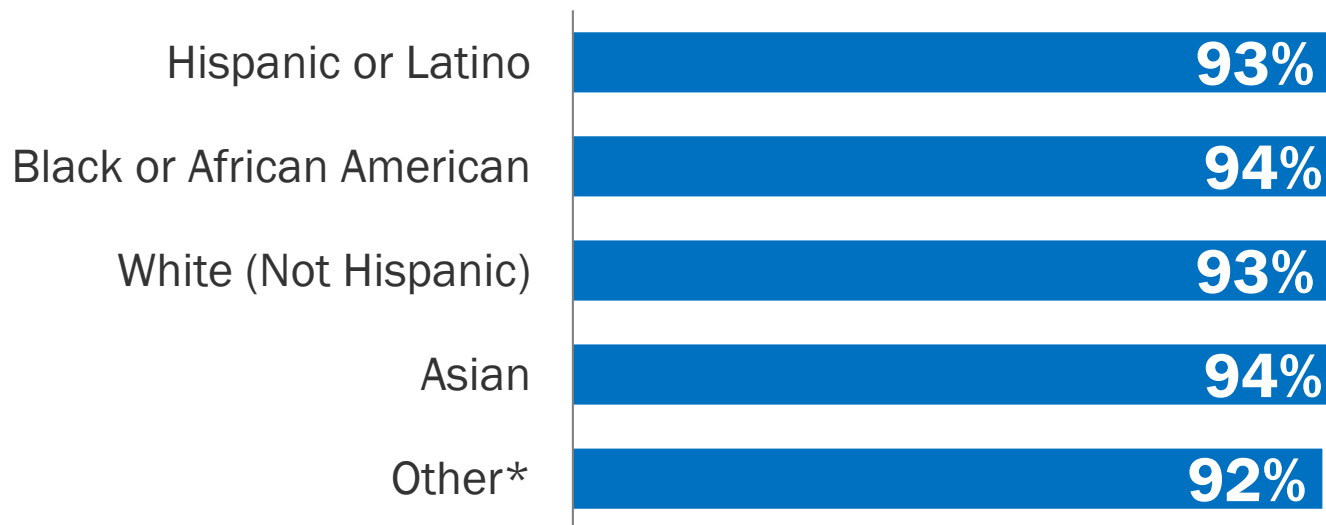

2017 AVID Seniors Completing Four-Year College Entrance Requirements

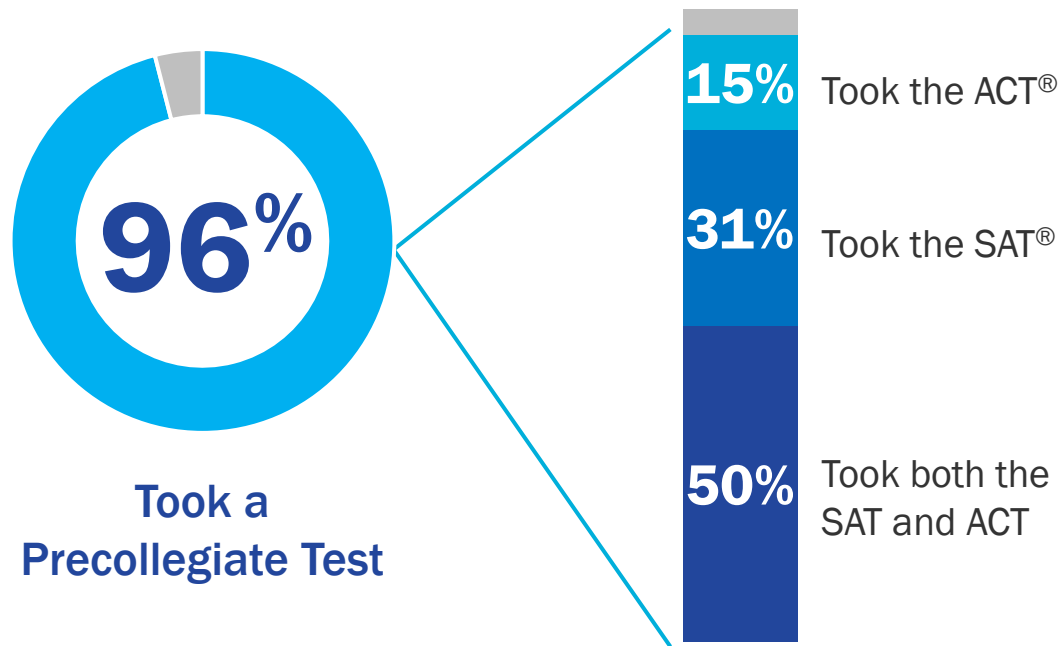


With AVID, all racial/ethnic groups complete four-year college entrance requirements at a rate of **92% or higher**, closing the achievement gap.

*Other includes American Indian or Alaska Native students, students of two or more races, and students who declined to state.

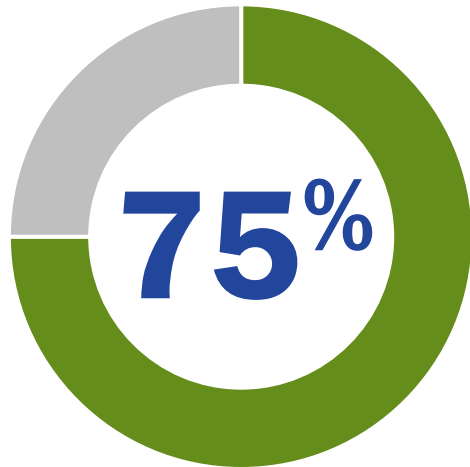

Precollegiate Testing – Class of 2017

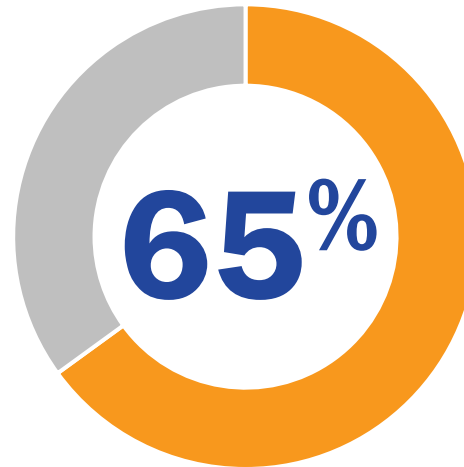


AVID seniors are committed to the college readiness process, and it shows in their precollegiate test-taking rates, with **9 out of every 10** taking a precollegiate test.
